"GATES & GARDENS" TOPIC FOR MAY 15TH MEETING

The May 15th meeting of the History Guild of Daly City/Colma will be tinkled to order with a cowbell from John Daly's dairy farm at 7:30 p.m. at Doelger Center.

Speaker for the evening will be Mrs. Betty Horn of the San Mateo County Historical Association, with an illustrated program on the beauty spots of San Mateo County. Titled "Gates and Gardens", many of the Peninsula's famous estates will be shown and discussed by Mrs. Horn, well-known as an expert on the subject. She is a member of the SMCHA Museum Auxiliary, the Funders of SMCHA, the Westerners' SF Corral and the Hillsborough Garden Club.

As an introduction to "Gates and Gardens", a few slides will be shown of Daly City's authentic mansion, that of hat-tycoon John Meussdorffer, whose beautiful, 22-room home was located on property now occupied by George Washington Elementary School, Hanover and Whittier. Still visible in the play yard is a cement plug which covers a former well for the block-square house and gardens.

CATALOGUING & DONATIONS

Cataloguing of materials at Serramonte Library has been slowed down to once a month, on the 2nd Tuesday, from 1-2:30 p.m. The plaque which had been on the front steps of the 2nd City Hall on Wellington Ave. has been salvaged, and is now in the collection at the Library. Installed for the May 1939 dedication of the building, the heavy metal insert reads:

This building dedicated to

**TRUTH-LIBERTY
- TOLERATION -**

by the
Native Sons of the Golden West
May 21, 1939

One corner of the plate was bent in the demolition, and we hope that some good soul will give us advice on how to straighten such a heavy ($\frac{1}{2}$ " piece of metal???

Other donations to the collection are 9 yard-square aerial photos of our area at the time when St. Francis Hts. was nearly completed and Serramonte was just being developed. The pix were found in the basement of City Hall and were salvaged and forwarded by good member Mike Wilson, whose very sharp eyes even found the tiny NBC letters which used to adorn the hill below Radio Road on San Bruno Mtn.

These pix became quite useful when we were asked about the terrain behind St. Andrew's Catholic Church on Southgate prior to its building. We were able to say that it looked like open pasture land, part of the Christen Dairy Farm.

LOLA'S LUNCHEON A LULU!

Member Lola Garcia was feted on April 6th last with a party attended by more than 200 at the Holiday Inn in San Francisco. It was a most happy occasion, with representatives from many of the North Peninsula organizations whose activities were highlighted in Lola's column over the 27 years she wrote for local newspapers.

The luncheon was sponsored by the South San Francisco Historical Society. Plaques and certificates were presented by national, state, county and local representatives, including those from U.S. Congressman Tom Lantos and Jackie Speier, by State Senator Quentin Kopp, County Supervisors Mary Griffin and Bill Schumacher, S.S.F. Mayor Jack Drago, D.C. Council Members Jane Powell and Al Teglia.

Lola's family was well-represented, including her sister who came to the event from Reno. The Historical Society went all out for this honoring, and paid great tribute to this tireless journalist, who promoted every worthwhile activity and organization. The speakers had a mutual theme, that of "praise for her contribution, and...it just won't be the same without Lola's column!" To which we append a rousing A-MEN!

WRITE IT DOWN...NOW!

A good lesson was learned recently at the Annual Meeting of the U.S. Naval Institute at Annapolis, Maryland, that of keeping good records, and WRITING THINGS DOWN! Attending the meeting were the Gillespies, who were delighted to witness a knock-down, drag-out panel discussion between pro and con factions of the question:

DID ROBERT PEARY REACH THE POLE?

In April of 1909, Arctic Explorer Peary claimed that he had indeed stood on the top of the world, where everything around him was straight south. He was regaled as a conquering hero, but in the past twenty years there have been a number of doubters, who have pointed to major discrepancies in proof-positive and raised questions that haven't yet been answered.

Peary didn't keep good records of his self-reported dash to what he said was the North Pole. His diary, only recently opened after 75 years, has major gaps, pages missing, loose-leaf inserted, and only a cursory mention of having reached the Pole. On the day he returned, his companion of 22 years of exploration reported his face gloomy and discouraged, not the face

of a world conqueror. The panelists included two men who'd reached the Pole, and who recounted the hardships and impossibility of making the miles that Peary claimed. Last year's confirmation of the feat by the Navigation Foundation (sponsored by the National Geographic Society) was poo-pooed as inconclusive, self-serving, etc., and the debate grew so heated that the moderator stopped the proceedings twice for a cooling-off period.

If his diary had been complete and accurate during the dash to the Pole, or at least filled in with credible data following, this discussion might never have been needed. PBS and Unsolved Mystery were filming, so perhaps we'll get a documentary shown sometime in the future.

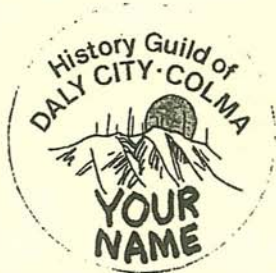

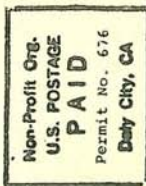
