From 1955 through 1983, selection of a "Miss Daly City" was a project of the local Chamber of Commerce, with individual sponsorships by local merchants. The contest continued for 29 years, and one year a runner-up filled out a term.

Trying to find former Miss Daly City winners hasn't been an easy task. Program chair Bunny Gillespie has been doing detective work for several months, and has found 9 of the former winners, mostly in California, but one as far away as Kansas. No, her name was not Dorothy Gale!

Four of the former reigning beauties have indicated intention of coming to the May 15th reunion, headed by center-piece speaker Lynette Fishel, Miss DC of 1961. She is a resident of Belmont. Her year was especially busy, since 1961 was the 50th Anniversary of Daly City, and there were innumerable civic functions at which her presence was a highlight. In that year there was also a Mrs. Daly City chosen, Mrs. Melford Battye.


NFL Hall-of-Fame inductee, Bob St. Clair, former '49er great tackle, was our DC mayor that year, and **BOB HAS SAID THAT HE WILL BE AT THE MEETING!**

Planning to attend, besides Miss Fishel, are Carolyn Richenbacher (1969), Selena Lencioni (1980), and Dianne Wagner (1971), who also became Miss California for 1972 and competed in the Miss America pageant in Atlantic City that year.

Nominations/Elections

At our upcoming meeting the nomination and election of Guild officers and directors will be held. A list of the current officers and directors is on the back of the Tattler.

Any members in good-standing are eligible for the slate to be elected. Our Nominating Committee chair is Jane Powell, who will receive any recommendations at 992-2757.

The officers and directors form the governing body of a non-profit organization of more than 500 members, who conduct five members' meetings per

year, operate a Mini-Museum on a weekly basis year round, provide historical information on request from the city government and the public, and are part of a county-wide network of similar organizations.

The Guild is self-sufficient financially, deriving its income from member dues and gifts and raffle monies from donations and meetings. The City provides free meeting space and room for the Mini-Museum in the Serramonte Library. Our Tattler is printed by the City at competitive-with-outside cost.

Address lists are on computer and Tattler mailings (five times yearly) are on a non-profit permit basis at the Daly City Post Office. We are continually grateful to the Babow family, Roz, Ted and son Richard, for their excellent membership roster works and care of our Guild finances.

Gateway on Dunks!

The weekend of June 1 & 2 will see the return of the GATEWAY FESTIVAL, a gala gathering of arts, crafts, community groups, food and entertainment, concentrating on the Festival's theme of "A Community of Cultures."

Our Guild will have its booth once more, for the 5th consecutive year. The Colma Historical Assn. will also have a booth, so that the historical aspect of the area will be well-represented.

This year the location of the fair will be on the paved area directly west of the Serra Bowl, on a street that has historical significance, **Dunks Street**. The street is only two blocks long, and only has a sign at the entrance to a parking area between San Pedro Road and Washington Street.

Dunks Street was named after an early-day Colma family, who originally owned a good deal of land along San Pedro Road, and who donated the lots on which Holy Angels Church was originally built.

At the corner of Dunks and Washington Streets was the home of **Margaret Pauline Brown**, early day educator, and after whom a school was named on Eastmoor, former Edgemar Road.

At the north end of Dunks she and her husband, Assemblyman **Henry Ward Brown**, had built a Protestant Sunday School which later became a community center, library, infant shelter, and the classrooms for the first years of Jefferson High School.

All this was swallowed up by the construction of the 280 Freeway, with the Brown house and community center now the on-ramp at Washington and Junipero Serra Boulevard.

Volunteers are sought to help man our Guild booth in two hour shifts on both days, from 10am to 5pm. The activity is most pleasant. The displays are self-explanatory, and it's a great way to show what our Guild is up to, and to meet and greet friends and neighbors. Our March program was a real hum-dinger, since everything hummed along and nobody dinged us!! The celebration of Daly City's 85th Anniversary was handled beautifully by Councilman Al Teglia, the only remaining Councilman from the 75th Anniversary board, from 1986, the year of the Diamond Jubilee.

There was a wide variety of 75th Anniversary souvenirs, brought by Al and from the Guild collection. Using the long microphone cord, Al picked out special items on the display tables and commented on the event(s) that belonged to the memorabilia.

A special song was sung, to the tune of "Kansas City", from the musical

"Oklahoma!", indicating that, as with the original, "Everything's Up To Date in Daly City!"

Since the preparation of a special audio-visual show for the 75th Anniversary was a real impetus to the Guild in 1986, a video version of the original "Picture Our Past" slide history was shown, on equipment from the Doelger Center. Many thanks to them for the cooperation of the Parks and Rec for their help!

The King and Queen of the 75th Anniversary celebration were decked out in sashes and tiara. Esther and Hartley Appleton looked most becoming. Their beautiful trophies were displayed and contributed to the Guild, and are now on view at the Mini-Museum.

Faithful Fran Bullard and Hearty Hartley Appleton really hustled the raffle tickets, and Mary Hutchings' fine Hospitality Crew, Bob and Enid Williams and Marilyn Olcese presented the tempting refreshments which had been brought by Mildred Eschler, Bianca Caserza, Pat Hatfield, Elsie Martin, Helen Nelson and Leonila Alvarez.
